


### Office of English Language Acquisition English Learners Who Speak Somali as a Home Language


#### Most Common Home Languages and Language Categories (Excluding Spanish) Spoken by English Learner Students in K-12: 2016–17 School Year<sup>1</sup>

During the 2017–18 school year (SY), Somali was the sixth most common home language group spoken by English learners (ELs) with 41,264 speakers.

## Numbers of Reported English Learner Students Who Speak Somali as a Home Language: 2009–10 School Year Through Fall 2017–18



Since SY 2009–10, the number of EL students in public elementary and secondary schools who speak Somali has increased by approximately 48%, or over 13,000 students.



During SY 2017–18, Minnesota and Ohio had the highest numbers of EL students who speak Somali (16,810 and 3,978, respectively). With 16,810, Minnesota's numbers were over four times the numbers of Washington, which was the state with the third largest numbers of EL students who speak Somali at 2,870. While Maine had the highest percentage of ELs who speak Somali, it was fourth in terms of the number of EL Somali speakers with 1,623 EL students who speak Somali.

# Percentages of English Learner Students Who Speak Somali<sup>2</sup> as a Home Language: 2017–18 School Year



During SY 2017–18, among all EL students nationally 0.82% of students, or 41,246, reported speaking Somali. Among the 50 states and Washington, D.C., Maine and Minnesota had the highest percentages of EL students who speak Somali out of all ELs (28.27% and 22.99%, respectively). North Dakota had the third-highest percentage of Somali speakers at 14.98%
