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NPD PROJECT DIRECTORS MEETING

OELA will host the 2013 National Professional Development Directors Meeting on March 4-5 at the U.S. Department of Education's headquarters auditorium. National Association for Bilingual Education (NABE), Feb. 7, 2013, in Orlando, Fla.

Session title: Transitioning English Learners' instruction to college and career-ready standards: Challenges and Opportunities

The focus of the panel discussion will be steps taken by states to include ELs and teachers of ELs in the transition to college and career-ready standards. Panelists will include representatives from RTT states who will share how they are addressing the needs of ELs in their professional development plans and with curriculum resources. The panelists will also share their progress in these areas in the hope that those in the field can learn from their experiences so far. Since 45 states have committed to implement career-ready standards and corresponding English language proficiency standards, OELA is positioned to be a conduit for sharing resources that address ELs.

Session title: National Education Leadership Forum: Preparing Every Learner to Compete Successfully in a Global Market

The panel will be composed of key national leaders with expertise in different areas of education: early learning, common core standards, career readiness, accountability, assessment, and technology. The goal is to be able to define what is needed to prepare our students to compete successfully in a global market. Researchers will make presentations to the panel whose members will then provide a response to the issues discussed. This forum is critical because, in America's schools, the linkage between language and education has added importance given two dynamic factors---the increasing linguistic diversity of the American people and the internationalization of economic activity.

Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL), March 21, 2013, in Dallas, Texas

Session title: Improving English Language Learners Instruction for Academic Language and Literacy Development in Support of the Common Core State Standards

The U.S. Department of Education is actively supporting projects that are building on the empirical evidence from recent research to develop instructional practices that support English Learners. This session will include presenters from Investing in Innovation (i3) and NPD projects who will share a set of high-leverage instructional practices for academic language and literacy development of English Learners; a model for preparing mentors to support teachers in enacting these practices; and a framework for building instructional resources to support English Learners.

National Science Teachers Association (NSTA), April 10, 2013, in San Antonio, Texas

Session title: Enhancing Science Instruction to Meet the Needs of English Learners in Grades 6–12

This is the second annual pre-conference session to be held at NSTA.
