






1. Create a Welcoming Environment Checklist

Creating a Welcoming Environment for English Learners and their Families Checklist

It is important to make English learners (ELs) and their families feel welcome at school. There are multiple ways you can build ELs' and their families' trust at your school.

Directions: First, review each of the following strategies to decide if you are currently making ELs and their families feel welcome in these ways. Then, consider action steps you will take to create a more welcoming environment for ELs their families.

Strategy At our school, do we....	Yes	No
Display student work on the walls (including work in home languages)?		
Have visible signs in students' home languages?		
Communicate with families in a variety of ways (e.g., information sent home in home language, phone calls, home visits)?		
Display maps and flags of students' home countries?		
Have a bilingual staff or bilingual volunteers who can meet with families as needed?		
Provide staff opportunities to learn some common phrases in families' home languages and key information about families' cultures?		




2. Build Relationships with EL Families

- Use an assets-based approach
- Begin from a place of empathy and assume the best
- Recognize that family engagement may look different in other cultures
- Take part in community events
- Hold a community walk
- Collaborate



3. Communicate Effectively with EL Families

- Need for two-way communication
- Parent interview to determine best ways of communicating (school level)
- Flexibility
- Variety of communication tools and strategies



4. Overcome Barriers to EL Family Engagement

Possible Barriers	Possible Solutions
 Language	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Parent liaisons• Bilingual staff• Translated materials• Home language phone tree/volunteers
 Transportation	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Rides to school events• Ride sharing resource• Information about public transportation• Meeting with families in their community
 Time	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Flexibility in scheduling conferences and events• Parent survey



4. Overcome Barriers to EL Family Engagement

 <p>Childcare</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">● Provide childcare for conferences and school events
 <p>Understanding of school system and role of parent</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">● EL meetings to provide information about school system and education● School tours● Community volunteers to share information in home language
 <p>Fear</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">● Demonstrated support for EL families (regardless of status)● Adult education programs● Family support groups

- Adult education
- Student goal setting
- Family advisory committees
- Committees and school support teams
- Volunteer opportunities



Questions to Ask School Staff About Enrolling Children in School-Topic 1


- Who can help me enroll my child in school?
- Will my child's siblings enroll in this school?
- What documents must I bring to school or the district office to enroll my child?
- How does my child get to school?
- Does the school have before- and after-school day care for my child?

Questions to Ask School Staff About Attending School in the United States-Topic 2

- Who do I call to find out which school my child will attend?
- Who do I ask to have an interpreter when I go to the school?
- How old does my child have to be to start preschool or kindergarten in the United States?
- Does the school require a uniform? What if I cannot afford to buy the uniform?
- What does my child do for lunch? Do I pay for the lunch?
- What will happen if my child has to miss school?
